SOCIAL JUSTICE CORNER

St. Francis offers us a wealth of material when contemplating an imitation of Christ. Should we sit on a mountaintop and pray? Francis suggested prayer was essential and his followers should spend time on renewing their spiritual life, but their primary mission would be “to win souls for God, through Christ.” He encouraged them to “preach by their actions.” The witness by example appeared to Francis to be at least as important as that of the spoken word. Preaching was not an end in itself. In returning to the lepers a number of times, Francis reinforced his message – in the lepers he discovered the crucified Christ. The revelation was that all men and women are brothers and sisters. “Everything that breaks the bonds of this fraternity desired by God is sin.” That is a pretty strong statement, but one which is true to the mission of Francis – to live in the image of Christ and to be one with our fellowman. One might say, “Wow!” How do I emulate that example? Francis reminds us that the rewards are many. Imitation of Christ leads to oneness with our God who gave us the means to do good and share in the love of God. What could be more joyful than capturing the feeling of universal love that Christ had for the whole world.

Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

This weekend's readings all focus on the universality of God's mercy. Isaiah's opening directs all people to do what is right! These words are for everyone, not just for those who considered themselves God's chosen people. He reminds the chosen people that all, even "foreigners", who love God and become his servants, are to be accepted and loved. God doesn't make distinctions based on ethnicity, social class, or economic standing. Believing in the Lord and keeping God's commandments are what really matters. We are challenged and reminded that God's criteria for accepting others should become ours.

The second reading speaks about discrimination. Some writers believe that it was a great sorrow for St Paul to know that so many of his own people had rejected Jesus. He says that, even though he considers himself the apostle to the Gentiles, he prays that his ministry will make some of his people "jealous" to the point where they will accept Jesus as their savior. It's a reminder that God can turn bad situations into fruitful opportunities. The Apostles are now free to expand their teaching from Jews only to all Gentiles. The covenant God made with Israel is still very much in force and the Gentiles have become part of that. St Paul is not forgetting the Jewish Christians and will continue to work toward unity between Jewish Christians and Gentile Christians in the early Church.

We all face difficult situations and can look to St Paul, the optimist: he reminds us that God's love is free and, as Isaiah says, given to all. Sometimes it's difficult to be optimistic in light of the struggles in today's world. Perhaps taking a prayerful look at St Paul's message can be a source of hope for us.

In the Gospel, Jesus meets a Canaanite woman and he is well aware of the hostility existing between Israelites and Canaanites. The woman was marginalized in the society of Jesus' time, because of her gender, her race, and her religious practice. At first reading, Jesus' response to the woman seems rather harsh. Perhaps we catch a glimpse of Jesus' humanity: humans don't always know everything and sometimes need to rethink things as they learn new information. Or, maybe Jesus' early responses were calculated to make a point. In appearing to reject the woman, he shows that discriminatory attitudes are cruel. He does listen to the woman, sees her great faith, and, in the end, praises her faith and healed her daughter.

We can also learn from the woman: she didn't give up! She was willing to risk rejection as she broke through conventional barriers (her gender, race, and religion) to seek healing for her daughter. In her humble yet insistent approach to Jesus, she shows us how to bring our own petitions to God.

Perhaps this weekend's Psalm summarizes the themes of all three readings:

May God have pity on us and bless us; may he let his face shine upon us.

So may your way be known upon earth; among all nations, your salvation.

May the nations be glad and exult because you rule the people in equity; the nations on earth you guide.

May the peoples bless you, O God; may all the peoples praise you!

May God bless us, and may all the ends of the earth fear him.
